# **CSM Geology Museum**

The Geology Museum at the Colorado School of Mines started as a 'mineral cabinet' put together by Arthur Lakes, the first curator of collections, in 1874. Today the Museum has approximately 50,000 minerals, fossils, gemstones, and artifacts, and is under the direction of Paul J. Bartos.

Each year, thousands of visitors, mineral collectors, and school children enjoy the exhibits and educational opportunities offered by the Geology Museum.

The current exhibits include Minerals from Colorado, Colorado Mining Heritage, Mining Artifacts, Gemstones - Rough and Cut, Mineral Properties and Earth History, Special Radioactive Exhibits, World Minerals, Fossils, and an impressive Gold and Silver Display.

Tours for school children of all ages are the museum's most important educational program. Tours are mostly indoors to learn about rocks, minerals, and fossils, but they can be outdoors to look at local geology if needed. Tours start on the hour, last one hour, and are free. Tours must be scheduled in advance and the museum can only handle up to 35 students per tour.

The Museum offers three types of hands-on educational kits that are loaned to the public for a period of up to three weeks. A refundable deposit of \$50 is required for each checkout. If, when a kit is returned and something is damaged or missing, or if the kit is returned late, an amount will be deducted (Continued on page 2)

from the deposit according to the prices provided on the contract. Kits may be reserved in advance, either in person or over the phone and may be picked up or dropped off only (they are not mailed) during regular business hours. The current types of kits offered are:

**Rock and Mineral Classroom Kits** which are ideal for learning about the rock cycle and/or mineral properties. In particular, the classroom kits were specifically designed to address the State of Colorado geoscience standards for 4th and 6th grade and have a wide

variety of minerals, are ideal for medium to large sized groups of up to 30. Equipment such as magnets, hand lenses, and HCl are provided as well as an activity guide book and an educational video to assist the teacher.

**Fossil Kits** are designed to teach students about fossils and geologic history and are more appropriate for junior high to high school level students. These kits include fossils of teeth, claws, plants, and more. A guide book is provided which explains the fossils included in the kit. A collection of worksheets is also provided, which the teacher may photocopy and distribute to the students.

**Teaching Trunks** cover a wide range of geologic concepts including the rock cycle, mineral properties, fossils, crystallography, birthstones/ gemstones, and more, and are better for smaller groups of less than 10 students.

The CSM Geology Museum is located at the corner of 13th and Maple Streets in Golden. Operating hours are 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Mondays through Saturdays. While the museum is open 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Sundays, it is closed on Sundays during the Summer and on all Colorado School of Mines holidays. Jerry Jensen reported that Bill Chapman at Gold-N-Detectors now has the software to print Colorado USGS topographical maps. Cost per 7.5' topo is \$ 8.95 each, printed on *waterproofed* paper. **Gary Hawley** reminded us that the highway through Clear Creek Canyon will be closed for repair on September 13, to reopen on October 4. Allen's topic was "Gold in the City." Always watch for new surface disturbances, for example, new construction, building repair, bridge repair, pipeline construction and repair, highway construction, gully clean-out, and sewer and drainage installation, for possible natural concentration of gold. Also some sewer drains have cement "silt pans" to retard clogging. You can volunteer to clean them out. Mershon cautioned that one should be discreet in actions around construction sites to avoid suspicion of trespass, mischief, or other foul play. Likewise, large backpacks and mysterious-looking equipment are not necessarily advisable. He mentioned that the bridge at Arvada Goldstrike Park was recently rebuilt and that the resultant damming of the creek exposed productive parts of the creek bed which

are normally below water. This was one of the areas of the early discovery of gold in Colorado and, although there are many earlier instances of gold discovery in the state, this was the first actually recorded. Finally, gravel operations constantly pump water which acts as a gold-concentrating mechanism. Coarse gravel bars rather than sand bars are more likely to yield gold. Again and always, be wary of private property and the consequences of un-permitted entry. Be reminded of our GPR Code of Ethics in which we "will respect private property..."

The most productive coiner of Colorado gold was the firm of Clark, Gruber & Co. The company struck their first year's coins from unalloyed native gold, but soon found that they abraded too easily. For the second year's production in 1861, alloy was added to harden the coins for circulation, but in both years this remarkably scrupulous company made its coins 1% heavier than federal issues. Clark, Gruber & Co. struck two-and-one-half, five, ten, and twenty-dollar gold pieces in both 1860 and 1861. The coins were modeled after the U.S. gold coins of the period except for the ten and twenty-dollar issues of 1860, which featured a fictitious view of Pikes Peak on the obverse.


