The Prez Sez by Jim Long

December is upon us and winter has settled in. I hope everybody got all their equipment winterized and stored away for the season. 2018 was a very busy year for the Club. We managed to get out on seven different prospecting outings during the year. It would seem that we have a core group of folks who like to get out and do their own digging along with a few others that are fairly new to the game and looking for some place to go and someone to go with. And we fit the bill for that. Though our prospecting ventures involve mostly public access, we do have access to a private claim in the Blackhawk area that has proved very lucrative for the Club.

I have been asked why the Club does not have any claims of our own for the members to utilize. The answer is fairly complicated and yet pretty simple. We don't have any claims because they cost too much money for the amount of gold that we would get - Short answer! The long answer is a little more complicated. First, we need to find one that is fairly close to town. There are requirements for outings. Things like sufficient parking for upwards of 20 vehicles for times when we want to have a Club outing. And we need to have or provide rest room facilities. The ladies are not too keen on stepping into the bushes if given any choice. The site needs to have sufficient placer gold enough to tolerate considerable digging for an extended amount of time. Consider that it would need to support 30 to 45 people on an organized outing upwards of a half dozen trips a year. Add to that, the use of the site by individual members who want to visit during those other days that there is no official Club event scheduled. Once the site has been located that meets all those requirements, we would need to file the claim after doing all the research to make sure the site was available and not already claimed. We would have to mark it and file with the appropriate authority. There would be a need for an insurance policy to indemnify the Club against civil action for injury or whatever. A bond would have to be posted and plans of operation and plans of reclamation would have to be submitted and approved. The approving agency would have the right to inspect the premise without notice to ensure that we were complying with said plans of operation and reclamation. For those few of you who have owned or do own a claim, you know what I am talking about. If the property has good quantities of gold, it can be worth it, but maybe not so much if it is being picked over by a lot of people on a regular basis. So what about buying an existing claim you say. The problem of the research and the paperwork no longer exists. But anyone who owns a claim that has really good values is going to want a pretty penny for it. That brings us to Club finances. There aren't any, short answer, at least not for buying a claim. Check the Treasurer's Report during the meeting and you will see. Our nugget purchases for the drawings keep the finances down to a couple of thousand dollars a year at most. We would have to raise the dues to an exorbitant amount which would result in a drastic and predictable loss of membership resulting in only those who could afford it having access to the claim for the gold that would be there. The sale of drawing tickets plus membership dues nets upwards of 11 or 12 thousand a year and the purchase of gold annually reduces that amount back down to 2 or 3 thousand. The price of gold fluctuates and has done so for the last 10 years. When it is up, gold costs more and we have to reduce the amount of nuggets we give away. When the price is down, we can buy more gold to give away. Part of the job of the Board of Directors is to ensure that we manage your money as wisely as we can. Keep in mind also, each Board Member is working for your interests and receiving no compensation for it. It is all volunteer work. So there you have it...! It would be nice and I am always on the lookout for possibilities and opportunities.

Anyway, that is the view from here and I wish you all Good Luck in your endeavors, no matter what they may be...! And until we meet again, keep your sunny sides up and may the bottoms of your pans turn bright with that treasured 'Yaller Gold'! Oh, and Merry Christmas and Happy Holidays to all our valued members and your families!

History Of The Ken Barker Award To Be Presented At The Dec 2018 Meeting

Long-time Gold Prospectors of the Rockies (GPR) member, Ken Barker, had taken over the position of Demonstrations Committee Coordinator in January 2000. The committee was charged with promoting "gold prospecting through the coordination, establishment, and sponsorship of gold panning demonstration booths." He started out with little more than a bucket of dirt, a tub, and a gold pan, and nursed the activity in to one of the most professional and sought after activities of any of the Front Range gold clubs.

Ken brought an air of professionalism to the club and a feeling of unity among the members. He perceived this club and the hobby of gold prospecting as a positive experience for the family as well as the individual.

Ken was elected to the office of vice-president for the 2003 term. Sadly, however, Ken passed away suddenly on the weekend of October 30, 2003. Those who worked with Ken in the panning demos all showed up at the November meeting in period costume and president Gary Hawley established the annual Ken Barker Award in Ken's honor.

The award is designed to recognize the club member who most closely exemplifies the love and passion for gold prospecting that Ken brought to the GPR organization. To be qualified for nomination for the award, a member must:

- be a GPR club member-in-good-standing,
- promote gold prospecting,
- promote the Gold Prospectors of the Rockies,
- participate in club activities,
- anticipate the needs of the club and do his/her best to fulfill those needs, and
- contribute to the success of the club with his/her extra efforts.

The recipient of the award is be selected by secret ballot at the club's November general meeting. At the December meeting, the award and a "Ken Barker Award" plaque is presented to the award winner.

Mining Concerns from Around the Country

(In my attempt to keep our members aware of what is happening involving mining from around the country, I will run this little section each month and see how it goes. I am apt to put a little passion and some direct finger pointing in my reporting, for which I will offer no apology to anyone who may feel offended. I support responsible mining and responsible miners, period. It is what it is, and it is strictly my opinion, and that is that, like it or not .jj)

Some Mining Claim Fees Increase – The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) has increased some of the filing fees associated with mining claims. Effective October 1, 2018, the BLM increased the fee from \$10 dollars to \$15 per mining claim for filing an amendment, transfer of interest, notice of intent to hold and affidavit of labor. The agency claimed the increase is warranted per their cost recovery rules. Other mining claim fees remain the same, including the \$212 fee for filing a new 20-acre claim, the \$155 maintenance fee per 20 acres, \$20 processing fee and the \$37 location fee. Reminder that all claim holders need to file a notarized and recorded affidavit of labor with the BLM by December 30 if a small claim waiver was filed last year. The new \$15 fee will be required with this filing. If you have already filed your affidavit and submitted the old \$10 fee, it is highly recommended that you contact your BLM office and find out if another \$5 is required. Be sure to keep notes on who you spoke with and their answers in case a challenge needs to be made at a later date. (I mentioned this once before a couple months back but since the December 30 date is coming up, a little reminder might be timely....jjl)

US Fish & Wildlife law enforcement Policing Powers Restrained — On September 21, President Trump stripped law enforcement authority from those Fish and Wildlife employees working as refuge managers. Full time law enforcement officers within the agency will remain, only those who have dual roles as both enforcement and refuge management will lose their law enforcement authority. The change is due to take place on January 1, 2019. (Food, I have commented in the past that some of those people have no business carrying guns because they think they can shoot you for stepping off the trail and 'killing' some poor never heard of before plant or gasp, frog....jjl)


