"A 49er's Tale." Part 1 of 4

(This story has been submitted by GPR Club Member Micheil Ross. It is the story about his great-great grandfather during the California gold rush. It is a bit long so he has divided it up into 4 parts. It is a glimpse into the lives of a real-life prospector from 175 years ago. Thank you, Mr. Ross, for this fascinating contribution...JJL) (A manuscript (lightly edited for punctuation, capitalization, and setting into paragraphs but not spelling and wording) from a 49er named Joe Burgess about part of his time during the 1849 California Gold Rush.)

In the summer and fall of 1851 I bought up A lot of Cattle from the emegrants as they came in of the plaines. We could get them very cheap as they ware generuley very poor or thin in flesh. By hearding them on good pastures threw the winter they would get vary fat, as fat Cattle brought a good prise.

In particular in the mines I selected me A plase 12 miles as we called the distance west of Sacramento City on putar(?) creek, or near Davises and Browns ranches on what was called at early days the island. There ware quite A number of Squatters or new settlers on each side of the Creek, among them was A Camp called the MtGomerys Camp. There ware outher partys that lived at the same camp.

They had settled that the fall Before on the MtGomery side of the Creek on what was called the Island. It was open timber with but little under Brust. On the south side it was very different there ware dense thickets of under Brust along the Creek perhaps 2 of A mile down it or untill the creek empteyed in the Tuley(?) swamps.

In the fall that the MtGomerys Boys settled thare. There was A man that living with them that was a hunter he seemed to think he cold kill a Grisley Bare allmost at his leshure as was A very stout man.

Thare had ben signs of Bares seen across the Creek so one afternoon he took his gun and a large Boenknif an started out across the Creek to hunt for Deer as they ware very plent along the thickets of Brush on the oposite side. He never caime back againe.

As this happened before I ever saw the creek, I am telling it as I remember it told to me by those that new the circumstances. As he didnot come home on the second Day, his friends on the third day got A company togeather of eleven men and crossed the crek in search of the missing man. They ware all well armed except a Sogier who caried an Ax to cut tharway through the Brusk. As they advanced, in case they war to thick to get through without the solger went in advance with his ax.

They are passing through one of the largest thickets as thare ware frequent openings when about the thickest part of it they herd a corse Growl and A great rumpus in the Brust. They sooon all became satisfied of the fact that they ware close to a Grisley Bare and like Cautious men they all retreated for the openings where they all arived safely, the solgier bringing up the reare

The following summer A party of men who had taken up a clame on that side of the Creek. Thare naimes was Joshua Hall of southern Illinois, Mr. Sluzbuck of Texas, and William M Allen of Indiana. Those three men had taken up thare claimes which included theas thickets of Brush whare it was supposed that the hunter from MtGomery Camp went hunting. Mr Hall and Zluzbuck and allen in laying out thare claime found it necessary to set stakes through theas thickets of brush and in cutting there way through they noticeed some clothing haning on a Bush nears thare rout.

They went to see what it was it proved to be A mans vest but they soon discovered the remains of the lost Missourie hunter from the MtGomery Camp. The surroundings went to show that he hadhad A deparate fight with A Grisley Bare. His gun had been shot of his Bowen Knife was missing.

It was supposed that he had been Badley hert by the Bare and that he had taken of his vest and bent down the Brus and fastened the vest on the Bush and let the Bush go up so it mite be A signal for help as he must have been to badly crippled to get home. At that time of the yeare the Bare wold hardley leave its winter quarters unless Compelled to. Thare ware caes nown whare Bares atacted men and leave them after Biting them up and go of some distance and lay down and watch and if the person undertook to get up the Bare wold go for him. It was supposed that the was the case with this unfortinate man.

I will now try and give you my experariences with what was supposed to be the saime Bare that Killed the man from the MtGomery Camp.

The Rainy Season Set in about the 12 of October. About the first of Jan 51 and 52 the high waters had prety well filled up the Tuley swamps so the Deer and Elk and Bare had left them for higher...
